What is a Variant?




- Viruses constantly change.
- When a virus changes, we call it a variant.
- Sometimes variants of a virus become more transmissible than the original.
- Sometimes variants of a virus cause more severe disease.

What is the Delta Variant?

The Delta variant spreads more easily than previous variants—it may cause more than **2x** as many infections



- Delta is an example of a variant.
- On August 6, 2021, the CDC announced that the Delta variant was the most common strain of the virus.
- The Delta variant is more infectious than the original SARS-CoV-2
- The Delta variant may also cause more severe disease in unvaccinated people than the original.

What is the Omicron Variant?



- The Omicron variant has 50 changes from the original.
- We call these changes a mutation.
- The Omicron variant likely will spread more easily than Delta or the original SARS-CoV-2 virus.
- The Omicron variant may be more resistant to medicine than earlier variants.

What are common symptoms of infection from the Omicron variant?

- Some unvaccinated people will need to be hospitalized.
- Some unvaccinated people may die from Omicron.
- Unvaccinated people are most at risk.
- Most fully vaccinated individuals with a booster will only experience mild symptoms.

What is the best protection against Omicron?



- Vaccination, plus a booster, is the best protection against severe illness from Omicron.
- The CDC recommends that everyone ages 16 years and older get a booster shot after completing their primary COVID-19 vaccination series.

- The CDC continues to recommend that everyone wear a mask in public indoor settings where there is a lot of COVID cases.
- The CDC has approved the use of N95 and KN95 masks for the general public.
- Whatever type of mask you choose, it is important that it is well-fitting and covers the nose, mouth, and chin.

Where can I get a free mask?



- The US government plans to distribute 400 million free N95 masks.
- The masks can be picked up at community health centers and pharmacies.



What if I need treatment and I don't have insurance?

- Call the doctor's office and tell them you do not have insurance.
- Ask them if they will agree to bill the federal government for COVID-19 services.
- Confirm with them that they will see you and that they will participate in the HRSA Uninsured program and bill the federal government, not you.
